Publicans' Licence Papers and Books, 1760-1895. These contain publicans' applications, certificates, bonds, oaths, with lists, returns and registers of licences granted.

## PARLIAMENTARY RECORDS.

These are records of the Irish Houses of Parliament which were abolished by the Act of Union. They were, soon afterwards, transferred to 35 Anglesea Street, and from thence later on to the Record Tower, on the recommendation of the Record Commissioners. Here they remained till 1870 when they were transferred to the Public Record Office.

## PRIVY COUNCIL OFFICE.

The Office of the Privy Council, which had formerly been located in Dublin Castle, was, at the time of the Commonwealth, removed to Cork House, beside the Castle (see Commonwealth Council Book, A/5, p. 101), but, by an order of 18th January, 1656, the Overseer of the State Houses in Dublin was directed to prepare rooms in the new Custom House, Essex Quay, for the Council Chamber and offices. In consequence of the fire which broke out in the Custom House in 1711, most of the Council Office papers were consumed. From a list found amongst the Carte Papers (vol. 67, p. 1), it would appear certain that the Signett Docquett Books, 1584-1677, and Letter Books, 1626-1676, were amongst the Council documents destroyed by this fire. Since then, the Privy Council Office has been situate within the walls of Dublin Castle, and the series of Order Books is quite regular.

Abstracts of business done in Council, etc., 1773-81.

These contain notes of work done in Council and Committees, and were afterwards entered up in the Minute Books. See also Minutes, Memoranda, etc.

Accounts, 1702-95.

Accounts of printing and stationery; of tradesmen and others for articles supplied for Houses of Lords and Commons, Dublin Castle, etc.; and of State messengers. These are heads of bills, public and private, arising either in the Council or in Parliament (in which latter case they were submitted to the Council for approval), with the Council's alterations. These papers include petitions of Ministers and Churchwardens to Lord Lieutenant for commissions to issue under 17 & 18 Car. II., s. 7, for the valuation of houses not included in, or built since, the last valuation, for the support of ministers; commissions, returns, etc. By 17 & 18 Vic., c. 11, Ministers' Money was abolished, and a rate levied instead, to be paid to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners. This came to an end in 1857, by the Act 20 & 21 Vic., c. 8. See also Fiant Books.

Concordatum.

This name was given to a special fund at the disposal of the Lord Lieutenant and Council for payment of extraordinary expenditure, and was so called from the initial words "concordatum est." It was especially designed for the payment of expenses "for freight, Transportation, carrying of Letters and other expenses and rewards, sea service, repairing and upholding sufficiently Our houses, maintaining our Forts, finishing needful undertakings of that kind, begun in apt places but not finished, erecting of more strength of like nature, in other fit and necessary places, dyett and charges of Keeping poor Prisoners, and sick and maimed soldiers in Hospitalls, Printing riding and travellieng charges prest upon accots, and all other payments among which the repairs of Fortifications and Provisions of hospitalls are chiefly to be taken care off by Concordatums of the Lord Lieutenant, Lord Deputy, Lords Justices or other chief Governor and Council."

From 1794 the power of granting a concordatum rested with the Lord Lieutenant alone.

Concordatum Fund, Accounts of, 1701-90. These are statements of payments made from the Concordatum Fund, by order of Council; copy warrants; applications for Concordatum, and receipts.

Council Roll and Book, 1392-3, 1581-6. The earliest record of the proceedings of the King's Council in Ireland is the roll of 1392-3, now in the possession of the Marquess of Ormonde, and published in the Rolls Series. The Red Council Book, which commenced in 1542-3 (though there is included an entry for 1531) and was, according to Sir Henry Sydney, the oldest Council Book known in his time,\* is not known to exist now, but a table of its contents, apparently compiled by Sir W. Ussher, will be found in the appendix to the Fifteenth Report of the Historical MSS. Commission, part 3, being the report on the MSS. of C. Haliday. A Council Book for 1556-71 will be found in the Royal Irish Academy, and has been printed in the above-mentioned appendix. A Council Book for 1581-6 is preserved in the Public Record Office (PARLIAMENTARY COLLECTION), and has been calendared and indexed. The report on the Haliday MSS. also contains lists of contents of two Council Books of Ireland, which are missing, and which commenced respectively in 1571 and 1589. From a reference on f. 53 of the Council Book, 1581-6, there was evidently a Black Council Book, which is not now known to exist. For continuation, see Commonwealth Books and Order Books.

Letter Books on Acts into England, 1711-95. Entries of letters accompanying transmisses of bills, giving the titles of the bills, and observations of the Privy Council upon them, for the information of His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State. For original drafts, see Bills into England, Draft Letters transmitting.

Letter Books (Domestic), 1667-89, 1711-1841. Entry books of letters from the Lord Lieutenant and Council on matters concerning the internal administration of the country. In the two earlier volumes (1667-89), the letters were usually signed by the Lord Lieutenant and Council, but in the series commencing with 1711, they were signed by the Clerk of the Council. The volumes between 1689-1711 were destroyed in the fire which consumed the Council Chamber in 1711. Many of these letters are concerned with the despatch of proclamations and orders to the country. Petitions, 1685-1820. Petitions and Memorials to the Lord Lieutenant and Council, on various matters, such as to take off embargoes; against valuation of Commissioners for Ministers' Money; for charitable relief; military memorials; petitions of prisoners; for pensions, divisions of parishes, etc. With these petitions will often be found the order of Lord Lieut., report of Council, informations, examinations, certificates, concordatum warrants, etc. See Deputy Keeper's Reports VI., pp. 25-8; XVII., pp. 22-5. PRIVY COUNCIL OFFICE.

Presentments, Examinations, etc., 1698-1813. These are presentments of Grand Juries against tories, rapparees, robbers and others for breaches of the peace, presented to the Lord Lieutenant and Council, usually praying for a proclamation. Copies of the affidavits, examinations, informations, etc., upon which the presentment was made are enclosed. There are also some miscellaneous

certificates and lists of Jurors. Described with examples in Deputy Keeper's Report VI., appendix 2, pp. 22-3. Calendared.

Proclamations, 1618-1829.

A series of printed proclamations have been bound and indexed. They extend from 1618-1829. There is a collection of engrossed proclamations, and also of unbound printed ones, from 1701-1811. Some of these latter are endorsed by the Clerk of the Council to the effect that the presentment, on which the proclamation was based, is in his custody; which certificate was necessary before the proclamation could be produced in evidence, under 9 Will. III., c. 9. See also Order Books, Letters out of England, and Council Book (1581-6). Catalogued in Deputy Keeper's Reports, XXII., pp. 35-41; XXIII., pp. 25-74; and XXIV., pp. 33-93.

Proclamations, Orders for drafting, 1711-1803. Orders to attorney or solicitor-general to prepare drafts of Proclamations.

Proclamations, Orders for engrossing, 1725-1811. Orders to Lord Chancellor to issue his Warrant to the Clerk of the Hanaper to engross proclamation.

Quarantine, Orders respecting, 1711-1812. Orders to Commissioners of the Revenue to allow ships in quarantine to proceed to their destination, or to examine into petitions against quarantine and to permit vessels to discharge, if satisfied. Some petitions included. Entered in Order Books.

Race Courses, 1712-77. Certificates of the Ranger of the Curragh of the winning mare for the King's Plate, concordatum warrants for payment of prize money, and Articles for the King's Plate.

Salvage Claims, 1783-1804.

Tithe Owners Relief Fund, Lists, etc., 1833-4. Lists and abstracts of claims of Tithe Owners, both lay and clerical, for arrears of tithes for 1831-3. Arranged in dioceses.

Transmisses, 1753-80.

Wine Duties, Orders respecting, 1726-85. 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## PRIVY SEAL OFFICE.

The keeper of the Signet and of the Privy Seal was formerly a Patent officer, and the office was usually held by one of the Secretaries of State. In 1817, by the Act of 57 Geo. III., c. 62, the office of Keeper of the King's Privy Seal was for the future to be held by the Chief Secretary for the time being, and by the chapter 63 of the same Act, the offices of Clerk of the Signet and Clerk of the Privy Seal were united. The fiants for letters patent passed through this office for the purpose of having the privy seal attached. Copies of the dockets attached to these fiants were entered in the office, but these books of entries were passed on to the Chief Secretary's Office.

## CHIEF SECRETARY'S OFFICE.

The Chief Secretary was originally the nominee of the Lorl Lieutenant, coming over with him and leaving the country at the same time. He did not receive any salary from the State, not being, like the Secretary for State, on the Establishment, but was remunerated by fees received for issuing warrants, commissions, etc. During the eighteenth century, he held a position of great importance, being the recognised leader of the Government side in the Irish House of Commons. On the frequent occasions of the absence of the Lord Lieutenant and his Secretary from Ireland, the official duties were carried on by the Lords Justices and their secretaries, who were in constant correspondence with the Chief Governor. On the departure of each Lord Lieutenant, it was the custom for him to carry away all his official documents. This practice was so inconvenient that Lord Capell in 1695 suggested that a Paper Office should be established, where entry books of orders should be kept, and that he was ready to commence with his own books. Probably in consequence of this offer, we find the series of entry books commencing in 1697, though the Paper Office was not established till 1702.\* The Paper Office was formed for the keeping of copies or duplicates of books of entries, wherein any King's or Queen's Letters, warrants, orders, petitions and other letters belonging to the Secretaries' Offices (copies of their private letters only excepted) were to be entered. The originals were, for a time, still carried away, but the copies served all administrative purposes. The original documents will be found in the archives of those noble families whose scions held the post of Lord Lieutenant, or in the British Museum.

The first entry of a salary being paid to a Chief Secretary on the Civil List was in 1794, when the Rt. Hon. Sylvester Douglas was Chief Secretary; while in 1795 the salary of the Principal

Secretary of State was revoked. By the Act of 57 Geo. III., c. 62, the office of Keeper of the Privy Seal was, on termination of existing interests, to be held by the Chief Secretary for the time being.

As a large degree of control over the army was vested in the Lord Lieutenant, many military matters passed through the Chief Secretary's Office. These became so numerous that in 1777, an Under Secretary for military business was appointed, with a separate staff of clerks. This Under Secretary was frequently, even officially, referred to as the Secretary at War, and his office as the War Office. In 1819, the office of Under Secretary for military affairs was abolished, and in 1831 the separate military department was discontinued, while the remaining clerks were included in the general staff of the Chief Secretary's Office, though the books and papers for military affairs continued to be kept separately till 1835.

Under the direction of the Under Secretary for military affairs, a separately organised office was formed in 1797 for the management of the business connected with the large number of Yeomanry Corps then formed through the country.

In this collection will also be found the records of the Con-

stabulary and Convict Departments.

The records of the Chief Secretary's Office are from time to time transferred to the custody of the Keeper of the State Papers in the Record Tower, Dublin Castle, from whence they are finally deposited in the Public Record Office, and are noted in the Record Tower Detailed Index in the Search Room.

When a King's Letter was received for a grant of lands, offices, etc., Docket Books, 1697-1830. the Lord Lieutenant issued a warrant to the Clerk of the Council, Attorney-General or Solicitor-General to make out a Fiant. This fiant, when made out, was accompanied by a short statement of the nature of the grant, called a "docket," which was entered in the Docket Office. The fiant and Docket were then sent on to the Signet Office, where the Privy Seal was affixed, before going on to the Chancellor. (See Fiant Books, Signet Office). From 1830, this series became Docket

## ECCLESIASTICAL AND TESTAMENTARY COLLECTIONS.

## PREROGATIVE COURT.

After the abolition of the jurisdiction of the Church of Rome, Commissioners were appointed, in Ireland, under the Act of 28 Hen. VIII., c. 19 (1536), to issue such faculties, dispensations, etc., as it was formerly necessary to sue for to Rome, but could now be given by the Archbishop of Canterbury. In the appointment of Acworthe and Garvey to be Commissioners of Faculties (Fiant 2996, Eliz., 1576-7), we find that the power of proving wills and granting administrations in the case of persons having goods in divers dioceses was also given to them. This grant was revoked in 1578, and in 1579 (25 May, 21 Eliz.), a commission was granted to Adam, archbishop of Dublin, and Robert Garvey, M.A., empowering them "to prove, approve and insinuate the testaments, codicils and last wills and to grant letters of administration, etc., of all and singular persons of the realm of Ireland . . . . which have goods and chattels . . . . in divers provinces, jurisdictions or dioceses . . . . . according to the course and order of the Prerogative Court of the Archbishop of Canterbury in the realm of England," etc.\* The Prerogative Court for Ireland was apparently created by Letters Patent of 1 Mar., 23 Eliz. (See Patent Rolls, Ireland, 25 Eliz., d.r. 7.)

By letters patent of 20 James I., the jurisdiction of the Prerogative Court in ecclesiastical causes and the Court of Faculties of Ireland was granted to the Archbishop of Armagh and his successors for ever. (See also Patent Rolls 2 Car. I. p. 2 and 8 Car. I. p. 1).

During the Cromwellian period, commissioners were appointed to act in all testamentary cases, but with the Restoration, the jurisdiction of the Archbishop of Armagh was restored.

In 1858 by the Act 20 and 21 Vic., c. 79, the testamentary jurisdiction was transferred to the new Court of Probate, and appeals, which had hitherto been carried before the Court of Delegates, were in future to be made to the Court of Appeal in Chancery. But the Court of Prerogative still continued to exist (till the disestablishment of the Church of Ireland in 1870) for granting special licences and faculties. This collection is indexed in the Testamentary Detailed Index.

The chief officers were a Judge or Commissary and a Registrar, appointed by the Archbishop.

## DIOCESAN REGISTRIES.

The jurisdiction of the archbishops and bishops in their several dioceses was of a twofold nature, being (1) a voluntary jurisdiction, consisting of the granting of probates and administrations; sequestrations of livings; institutions and collations; licences for marriage, for curates, schoolmasters, etc.; conservations of churches and churchyards; granting of faculties for building and altering glebe houses, and churches, etc., and (2) a contentious jurisdiction, which comprehended testamentary and matrimonial

suits, tithe cases, and causes of correction, such as simony, immorality, non-residence of clergy, and defamation, adultery, etc.,

Except at the times when visitations were held, the bishop's of the laity. duties were delegated to a judicial officer, who combined the offices of Official Principal, Vicar General, Chancellor and Commissary General, who could appoint a deputy or surrogate, and to a Registrar, who, either by himself or his deputy, kept the records and proceedings of the Court, issued copies of wills, prepared visitation books, prepared and registered titles of the clergy, etc. There was also a Seal Keeper and an Apparitor. Appeals from these Consistorial Courts were made to the Metropolitical Courts, and from them to the Court of Delegates.

Upon the passing of the Probate Act of 1857 (20 and 21 Vic., c. 79), these Courts and the Court of Prerogative were deprived of their testamentary jurisdiction, and most of the testamentary records belonging to the Diocesan Registries (with the exception of the diocese of Meath\*) were transferred to the Central and District Registries of the Court of Probate, from whence they were removed to the Public Record Office after the passing of the Public Records (Ireland) Act in 1867.†

By the Act of 27 and 28 Vic., c. 54 (1864), certain of the Courts and Registries were united.

By the Act of 32 and 33 Vic., c. 42, it was ordered that all the remaining jurisdiction of these Ecclesiastical Courts, whether contentious or otherwise, in all matters matrimonial, spiritual or ecclesiastical, should cease from 1st January, 1871. By the Act of 33 and 34 Vic., c. 110, a Court for Matrimonial Causes and Matters was constituted, to which all matrimonial causes still pending in the Ecclesiastical Courts at the end of the year 1870 were transferred.

The remaining Matrimonial records were transferred from some of the Diocesan Registries to the Principal Registry of the Court for Matrimonial Causes and Matters, from whence they have been transferred to the Public Record Office, but in other registries, they were so mixed up with the remaining testamentary records that the separation would have involved much labour, so they were transferred with them to the Public Record Office. (See Deputy Keeper's Report, V., p. 15.)

In 1871, under the 47th section of the Act 32 and 33 Vic., c. 42, all deeds and papers respecting Church property in the different registries were handed over to the Commissioners of

Church Temporalities in Ireland, by whom they were subsequently transferred to the Irish Land Commission, under the Act of 44 and 45 Vic., c. 71, whence they came to the Public Record Office.

## EXEMPT JURISDICTION OF NEWRY AND MOURNE.

The ecclesiastical jurisdiction of the lordship of Newry formerly belonged to the abbot of the Cistercian Abbey of the B.V.M. and St. Patrick of Newry. In 1543, it was incorporated in a secular college, but the college, and all its possessions, were granted by Edward VI. (6 Ed. VI.) to Sir Nicholas Bagnal, to be held in as ample a manner as they had been enjoyed by the former abbots. Thus the proprietor, as lay abbot, had the right of holding ecclesiastical courts, granting probates of wills and licences of marriage, etc., just as any bishop could; and he also exercised the same right over the manor of Mourne and Greencastle, the territory of which had been included in the grant above referred to. He appointed a vicar-general, and the jurisdiction was exempt from that of the Bishop of Dromore.

On the passing of the Act 20 & 21 Vic., c. 79, the testamentary business was handed over to the District Registrar of Belfast.

On the disestablishment of the Irish Church, the parish of Newry was placed under the jurisdiction of the Archbishop of Armagh, while the other parishes were brought within the diocese of Down.

#### PROBATE AND MATRIMONIAL DIVISION

#### (including Court of Probate, and Court for Matrimonial Causes and Matters).

By the Act of 20 and 21 Vic., c. 79, the testamentary jurisdiction of the ecclesiastical courts in Ireland was abolished, and became vested in a new Court called the Court of Probate, of which the Judge of the late Prerogative Court became the first Judge. To this Court there was attached a Principal Registry with District Registries throughout the country.

By the Act 33 and 34 Vic., c. 110, on the disestablishment of the Irish Church, the jurisdiction in matrimonial causes formerly belonging to the Archbishops ceased to exist by law, and a Court called the Court for Matrimonial Causes and Matters was established, of which the Judge of the Probate Court became the Judge.

By the 34th section of the Judicature Act (1877), the Probate Court and the Court for Matrimonial Causes and Matters were merged in the Probate and Matrimonial Division of the High Court of Justice.

Appeals from the decision of the Judge of the Court of Probate were made to the Court of Appeal in Chancery, till 1877; since the Judicature Act of that year, they have been made to the Court of Appeal in Ireland.

### PARISH REGISTERS AND DEEDS.

#### PARISH REGISTERS.

There does not appear to have been any obligation on the clergy of the Established Church of Ireland to keep registers of baptisms, marriages and burials before 1634, when they were required to do so by the 46th Canon.\* Very few of the parishes

<sup>\*</sup> There had been an attempt at recording births, marriages, and burials by appointing a Public Register in 1617, but no traces of the registers are forthappointing a Public Register in 1617, but no traces of the registers are forth-coming, (see Preface to the Registers of S. John Dublin, issued by the Parish Register Society of Dublin), and by an ordinance of 1653 passed by "Barebone's Parliament," it was enacted that all marriages should take place before a Justice of the Peace and that a "Register" should be appointed in each parish who should record such marriages in a register. possess registers of such an early date, and during the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries, there would appear to have been considerable laxity in some dioceses in keeping such regis-(See Returns of the Registrars of the Diocesan Courts, Record Commissioners' Reports). The Record Commissioners in 1812 pointed out their importance and the necessity for their safe preservation, and suggested that legislative action should be taken, but nothing was done till, by the Act of 38 and 39 Vic., c. 59, the registers of the parishes of the late Established Church of Ireland were brought under the control of the Master of the Rolls, and were, upon the death or resignation of the person who was the parochial officer on 31st December, 1870, to be removed to the Public Record Office. This Act was amended by the Act of 39 and 40 Vic., c. 58, by which the Master of the Rolls may permit parish registers, which would have been attachable under the former Act, to remain in the charge of the incumbent of the parish, if satisfied that they are kept in a fit and safe building, and that due provision is made for their safe custody. A list of parishes of the late Established Church, with the dates of the registers, and an indication of their place of deposit (viz., whether in the Public Record Office or in local custody) will be found in the Deputy Keeper's Report, XXVIII., appendix 2. See also Report XLI., appendix I.

Besides these registers, there is a class called Parochial Returns (in England called "Bishops' Visitations"), being extracts of baptisms, marriages and burials from the parish registers, returned at the Annual Visitations under the 46th Canon. They are very imperfect as a series, but are useful in cases where the original registers may have been lost, and will be found entered up in the Parish Register Detailed Index.

### EXTINCT JURISDICTIONS.

#### PALATINATE OF TIPPERARY.

This jurisdiction was created by Letters Patent of 9 Nov., 1328 (2 Ed. III.), and granted to James le Botiller, Earl of Ormond, for life, but was continued by various grants and confirmations until seized by the Crown by process of Quo Warranto in 1621. It was revived in 1662, and was continued till 1715, when, on the attainder of James, Duke of Ormond, this jurisdiction was abolished under 2 Geo. I., c. 8.

The extent of this palatinate originally corresponded with the then county of Tipperary, but did not include the county of the cross of Tipperary, or the district of Dough Arra or "MacBriens County," which forms the major portion of the present barony of Owny and Arra. These latter were, however, included in the grant of 1662, when the jurisdiction was restored.

The administration consisted of a court of Chancery with a Chancellor, a court of pleas of the Crown and a court of Common Pleas with a Seneschal and a Justice, a Sheriff and Sheriff's courts (courts of Turn, Leet and County Courts), Coroners, etc., wherein the respective officers had all the authority of similar

officers in the King's Courts, etc. The Act of 2 Geo. I., c. 8, provided for the removal of all fines and recoveries and all records in the Court of Record to the Court of Common Pleas in Dublin. Also it enacted that all bills, answers, pleadings, decrees, etc., of the Court of the Chancery of the Palatinate of Tipperary should be removed to the High Court of Chancery and indictments into the Crown Office, King's Bench, and that all uncompleted cases should be continued in these Courts.

## COURT OF CASTLE CHAMBER.

The Court of Castle Chamber, or Star Chamber, of Ireland, was apparently constituted in 1563 for the purpose of trying cases of riot, conspiracy, perjury, forgery, etc., which could not be effectively prosecuted in the Common Law Courts. Its procedure was modelled on that of the Star Chamber of England. During the Commonwealth, its powers were in abeyance, but attempts made, on the accession of Charles the Second, to restore it proved ineffectual. A volume of entries of Orders or Decrees of the Court, 1573-1620, is in the possession of the Earl of Egmont, and is calendered in the first volume of the Egmont Papers published by the Historical MSS. Commission (1905). A volume in Trinity College Library (G. 3. 1) entitled "Star Chamber Tryals" contains not only transcripts of many of the decrees in the above volume, but also of others up to 1630. See also Proceedings of the Royal Irish Academy, Vol. XXXII, Section C, No. 10, for an account of this Court.

By an order of the Lord Deputy and Council in 1655 (Commonwealth Council Book, 1654-7, A/10, p. 41), "all the books, papers and records in the late Courte of Starr Chamber, and now in the custody of Mr. William Sands" were ordered to be delivered up to the Master of the Rolls, or his chief clerk, but they are not to be found in the Rolls collection.

#### COURT OF DELEGATES.

The Court of Delegates was held by commissioners or delegates appointed by the Lord Chancellor under the Act of 28 Hen. VIII, c. 6, to hear and determine appeals formerly made to the See of Rome. To these were added appeals from the Judge of the Court of Admiralty under the Act of 23 and 24 Geo. III, c. 14. The officer of the Court was called the Registrar of Appeals and Provocations Spiritual.

On the creation of the Court of Probate in 1858, testamentary appeals were directed to be carried to the Court of Appeal in Chancery, and in 1867, by the Act of 30 and 31 Vic., c. 114, s. 91, the appellate jurisdiction in Admiralty cases was also transferred to the Court of Appeal in Chancery, but the Court of Delegates continued to exist till 1870 for matrimonial and other ecclesiastical appeals. The records were transferred in 1879 from the custody of Mr. E. J. Farrell, clerk to the late Registrar of the Court.

### COURT OF WARDS AND LIVERIES.

Previous to 1622, the custody of wards, idiots and lunatics, and the management of their estates, the granting of licences and pardons of alienation, etc., were granted to Commissioners, but in 1622 (Pat. Roll 20 Jac. I., pt. 11, d, m. 27) a Special Court was established, called "The King's Court of his Wards and Liveries." The articles and instructions to be observed by the officers are set out in the above-mentioned Patent Roll, in which collection those of the Court of Wards will be found.

The only records of this Court in the Public Record Office are a book entitled Entries of Fines of the Court of Wards and Liveries, 1637-41 (Crown and Hanaper Office) and the Inquisitions post mortem, which were formerly returned into this Court, but in 1636 (Pat. Roll, 12 Car. I., pt. 1, m. 61) an order was made making them returnable into the Rolls Office.

This Court was abolished in 1662 by the Act of 14 and 15 Car. II., c. 19, by which feudal tenures were terminated, and the care of idiots and lunatics was entrusted by the Crown to the Lord Chancellor. (See Lunacy Office.)

The Court was originally held in the King's Bench, but in 1637, through the exertions of Lord Deputy Strafford, a Rolls Office and a Court of Wards was built at the King's Inns.

# THE LIBERTY OF SAINT SEPULCHRE.

The jurisdiction of the Liberty of Saint Sepulchre was granted to the Archbishop of Dublin and his successors, and was both criminal and civil. On the Patent Roll 11 Car. I., p. 1, m. 39, is enrolled a charter which recites, by inspeximus, several ancient charters granting this jurisdiction. The earliest is a charter by John, Earl of Morton, and Lord of Ireland, to John, Archbishop of Dublin. The extent of the Liberty may be gathered from the fact that it comprehended the manor of St. Sepulchre, in the county and city of Dublin; the manors of Tallaght, Rathcoole or Clondalkin, Shankill, Swords (including Lusk, Clonmelkin and Rush), and Finglass, in co. Dublin; the manor of Ballymore Eustace in co. Kildare, and that of Castlekevin in co. Wicklow. By the Act of 7 Geo. IV., c. 41, amended by the Act of 7 and 8 Geo. IV., c. 59, the civil bill jurisdiction was extended to this Liberty. The Liberty was abolished in 1856 by the Act of 19 and 20 Vic., c. 57, and an account of it will be found in the Report on the City of Dublin, being the appendix to the First Report of the Commissioners on the Municipal Corporations in Ireland. The records of the Liberty were removed to the Public Record Office from the Court of Probate, to which they had been transferred with the testamentary collection of the Consistorial Court of Dublin, the Judge of which Court had formerly been Seneschal of the Liberty.

### PRESIDENCY COURTS.

· In the reign of Elizabeth, the provinces of Munster and Connaught were each given a local government under a President and Council, and a regular Court was established, with a Chief and Second Justice, Attorney-General, etc. The first President of Munster was appointed in March, 1568, and that of Connaught on the 1st June, 1569. Both Courts were abolished by Royal Order of 26 Aug., 1672.

The only record of either of these Courts in the Public Record Office is a Roll of Pardons produced to the Connacht Court, 23-35 Eliz. (Plea Roll, No. 502). But in the British Museum (Harl. 697) there is a Council Book of Munster for 1601-1621. For the appointments of Presidents and Officers of the Courts,

The loss of the documents of the Court of Munster is explained by the Earl of Orrery in a letter to Clarendon, 27 April, 1663 (Clarendon Papers, Bodleian Library, Oxford), as having been due to the rebellion of 1641. In 1673, the year following the abolition of this Court, an Order in Council was made, directing the pleadings and proceedings to be removed to some desirable place in Dublin (see Deputy Keeper's Report XVII., p. 26), but nothing is known as to what became of them. There is much information about these Courts in the Preface to Calendar of State Papers, Ireland, 1606-1608.

## COMMISSION FOR ECCLESIASTICAL CAUSES.

Commissioners were appointed in 1568 to exercise all spiritual or ecclesiastical jurisdiction in Ireland. The only record of this Commission in the Public Record Office is the Registrar's Book, containing the acts of the Commissioners, 1570-3; entries of the recognizances before the Commissioners, 1573-7, and copies of EXTINCT COMMISSIONS.

some exhibits of the same period and the preceding reign. It was transferred to this Office from the Office of the Master of the Exchequer, and is indexed in the Exchequer (Revenue Side) Detailed Index.

By the Act of 44 Geo. III., c. 106, Commissioners were appointed to inquire into the fees, gratuities, perquisites, etc., of several public offices. The following only are in the Public Record Office, having been received from the Record Tower, Dublin Castle, in 1882.

#### IRISH RECORD COMMISSION.

A Commission was issued in 1810 to inquire into the condition of the Public Records in Ireland, and to methodize, regulate and digest them. The Commissioners issued three printed volumes of reports with several supplements, which contain much valuable matter, and important lists and schedules, but their labours came to an end in 1830 before the work was finished. \_(See Statement, Comrs. Public Records, Ireland, House of Commons Papers, 7 July, 1830.) The Commissioners sat in the Record Tower, Dublin Castle, whence a portion of the documents belonging to the Commissioners was transferred to the Custom House in 1839 and 1858, and afterwards to the Public Record Office; the rest remained in the Record Tower till they were transferred to the Public Record Office in the years 1868 and 1895. It was the intention of the Commissioners to extract in full all the most important State Papers to be found in the Public Records, and to print them in a series to be called "Acta Regia Hibernica." Extracts were made from the Patent Rolls of James I., and are bound up in seven volumes. A considerable number of extracts were also made from the other Patent Rolls, also from Plea and Memoranda Rolls (see below, under these heads), but they still remain in loose sheets. The work was never completed.

These were purchased by the Government in 1783, and deposited in the office of the Civil Department of the Chief Secretary. In 1811, at the request of the Record Commissioners, they were handed over to them. The two volumes entitled "Patentee Officers" formed the basis of Mr. Lascelles' Liber Munerum Publicorum Hiberniae. The volumes comprise the following subjects: Acta Regia Hibernica; Convert Book; Crown Presentations, with index; Enrolments, Counties Palatine, Exclusive Grants, etc.; Irish Chiefs, Denizations, General Pardons, etc.; Irish Baronage; Irish Peerage (Queen Anne); Members of the King's Inns; Parliamentary Register; Patentee Officers; Patent Roll (King's Letters, Hen. VIII.), Records of the Rolls, with index; Stenographic Notes; Wardships, Liveries and Alienations. There is also a copy by him of the Civil and Military Establishment of Ireland.

# LORD LIEUTENANT'S SCHOOL BUILDING FUND COMMISSION.

# IRISH EDUCATION INQUIRY.

This Commission was opened in 1832, and the records consist of the returns of archbishops, bishops, and clergy to inquiries about their revenue and patronage (transferred to the Public Record Office from the Land Commission, to which they were apparently sent at the time of the disestablishment of the Church of Ireland, and set out in the Miscellaneous Detailed Index), and a Letter Book, dated 1832-3, which will be found in the Record Tower collection. The Commission sat in the Council Chamber, Dublin Castle.

#### ECCLESIASTICAL COMMISSION.

By the Act of 3 and 4 Will. IV., c. 37, First Fruits were abolished in Ireland, and an annual tax substituted therefor, the number of bishops was reduced, and the revenues thus saved and the annual tax imposed were to be applied to the building, repairing, etc., of churches and the augmentation of small livings, while the tenure by which Church lands were held was altered, and tenants of See leases were able to purchase the interest in the lease. Commissioners were appointed to carry out the Act, and the records of the late Board of Trustees of First Fruits were handed over to them. The corporation of the Ecclesiastical Commissioners in Ireland was dissolved by 32 and 33 Vic., c. 42, and its property vested in the Commissioners of Church Temporalities in Ireland, which body in its turn was merged in the Irish Land Commission by the Act 44 and 45 Vic., c. 71.

## IRISH RELIEF COMMISSION.

On the failure of the potato crop in Ireland in 1846, an Act was passed (9 and 10 Vic., c. 107) "to facilitate the employment of the labouring poor for a limited period in the disturbed districts in Ireland," and the Lord Lieutenant appointed Commissioners to supervise the administration of relief. As the above Act was found insufficient, in the following year the Act of 10 Vic., c. 7, was passed to make further provision for the relief of the poor. The records below classed as "Custom House Collection "consist of such records belonging to the late Commission which were in 1848 transferred from the Commissioners' Office in Dublin Castle to the Record Department at the Custom House, from whence they were transferred to the Public Record Office in 1869. The records classed as "Commissariat Department" consist of documents belonging to the Irish Branch of the Commissariat Department of the War Office, which was largely concerned, during the famine period, in organising the system of relief and distributing the food supplies. These documents were removed in 1852 to the War Office, where they were arranged in 1854 by Mr. Lascelles. They passed to the Public Record Office, London, with other War Office papers, and were, with the sanction of the Army Council, transferred to the Public Record Office, Dublin, in 1907.

# CUFFE STREET SAVINGS BANK.

Commissioners were appointed in 1850 by the Treasury to investigate the claims of depositors in the Cuffe Street Savings Bank, Dublin. This collection includes bank ledgers, Savings Bank repayment books, pass books, etc., belonging to the Bank, and was transferred from the apartments occupied by the Commissioners in the Castle to the Public Record Office in the Custom House in 1851.

## ENDOWED SCHOOLS COMMISSION.

Commissioners were appointed 14 Nov., 1854, to inquire into the endowments, funds, and actual condition of all schools endowed for the purpose of education in Ireland, and by the Act 18 and 19 Vic., c. 59, they were directed to report thereon. The Commission was extended to 1st February, 1858, in which year the report, and a volume of papers accompanying the report were printed. Two volumes of evidence had appeared the year previously. The papers of the Commission are contained in portfolios, one for each county, with two volumes of proceedings and one roll of maps. The office of the Endowed Schools Commission was situate in Dublin Castle. The records were transferred in 1882 to the Public Record Office from the Lunacy Office.

### BELFAST ROYAL COMMISSION.

A Royal Commission was issued in 1858 to inquire into the state of municipal affairs of the Borough of Belfast. The documents deposited in the Record Office consist of the report, shorthand notes of evidence, minutes of proceedings, etc. They were lodged in the Public Record Office, Custom House, under the warrant of the Under Secretary, dated 25 January, 1859, to the Paymaster of Civil Services, and were afterwards transferred to the Public Record Office, Four Courts.

#### IRISH RAILWAY COMMISSION, 1867-8.

The documents belonging to this Commission were transferred to the Public Record Office from the former Statistics Office, Four Courts. They comprise Acts of Parliament, and maps, plans and sections, concerning Railways, Canals, and Rivers, original permanent way books and station books and plans, General Navigation and Railway Reports, letters, reports, etc., with maps, on Foreign Railways, and returns to the Commissioners, with sets of Ordnance Survey Maps.

#### CARTE PAPERS.

In 1863, the Carte Collection of MSS. in the Bodleian Library, Oxford, was examined in order to discover what documents relating to Ireland were amongst them, and whether such would be suitable for being calendared. A Report on the subject was presented to the Master of the Rolls (England). The Lords of the Treasury decided that it would not be expedient to calendar the MSS., but, on the recommendation of the Master of the Rolls, authorised the making of duplicate copies of such Irish official documents as should be deemed suitable. For this purpose, Mr. J. P. Prendergast was appointed Commissioner in 1865, and with him was afterwards associated the Rev. Dr. Russell. Their reports will be found as appendices to the Reports of the Deputy Keeper (England), 1864-70, that for 1870 being their final and general report upon the Carte MSS. One set of the duplicate volumes of transcripts (forty-one in number) was deposited in the Public Record Office of Ireland during the years 1868-70. The commission was suspended and never continued. In 1887, the Treasury authorised the purchase of further transcripts which MISCELLANEOUS DOCUMENTS.

had been made by Mr. Harpur, the transcriber, in the expectation that the suspension of the commission would only be temporary, and these transcripts were deposited in this Office in that year.

Dix, esq., and was presented by him to the Public Record Office in 1905. This Office is also indebted to him for the Auction Sale Catalogues of John W. Sullivan, successor to the above, for the period 1881-92, which were presented by Mr. Dix in 1907.

# CHOLERA REPORTS.

## CHRIST CHURCH DEEDS.

This collection of deeds consisting of ancient bulls, grants, leases and other muniments belonging to the Dean and Chapter of Christ Church Cathedral, Dublin, and covering the period 1174-1867, was deposited in the Public Record Office in 1872. These are the originals of many of the instruments transcribed into the Register called "The Black Book of Christ Church," which was not deposited here. A calendar of the deeds of the period 1174-1684 has been printed, and will be found in the Deputy Keeper's Reports XX., appendix 7; XXIII., appendix S, and XXIV., appendix 8, with an index in the appendix to the Deputy Keeper's Report XXVII. The deeds of a later date have been calendared, but have not been considered of sufficient importance to print. On the back of an Account Roll (No. 235) is written an early English poem, which is regarded as the earliest known moral play, or morality, in the English language. The roll and the poem have been edited by Mr. James Mills, the late Deputy Keeper, for the Royal Society of Antiquaries of Ireland in "Account Roll of the Priory of the Holy Trinity, Dublin, 1337-46." The references to the destinations of these deeds will be found in the Miscellaneous Detailed Index.

### FOUR COURTS MARSHALSEA.

This prison was of ancient origin, and was attached to the Court of King's Bench. It was governed by a Marshal and Deputy Marshal. By the Act of 5 and 6 Vic., c. 95, it was enacted that it should in future be the prison for all debtors, etc., including those who, before the Act, would have been imprisoned in the City Marshalsea, Sheriff's Prison and Newgate. It was closed by the Act of 37 and 38 Vic., c. 21 (1874), and all the records were removed to the Record Tower, Dublin Castle, from which repository they were transferred to the Public Record Office in 1881.

## HUGUENOT RECORDS.\*

In 1665, the French Protestant Refugees were granted the chapel of St. Mary in St. Patrick's Cathedral to worship in, on condition of their being bound by the discipline and canons of the Church of Ireland. In 1701, they took a site on the other side of the river, and built the Chapel of St. Mary as an annexe of the Church of St. Patrick. In 1704, consequent upon a disagreement, this church of St. Mary started with ministers and officers of its own till 1716, when the two churches were united. The registers have been published in the 7th volume of the Publications of the Huguenot Society of London. Many of the refugees, however, preferred to adhere to the form of service in use in their native country, and formed congregations at Peter Street and Lucy Lane. The registers of these congregations have been published in the 14th volume of the Publications of the Huguenot Society of London. # IRISH STATE PAPERS (PHILADELPHIA).

These five volumes which had come into possession of the Library Company of Philadelphia, were returned in the year 1868 to the British Government and deposited in the Public Record Office of Ireland. They consist of

## OFFICE FOR AUDITING ACCOUNTS OF CHARITABLE DONATIONS AND BEQUESTS, AND COUNTY TREASURERS' ACCOUNTS, 1837-1877.

The duty of auditing the accounts of the County Treasurers was referred to the Chief or Second Remembrancer of the Exchequer under the Act 7 Will. IV. and 1 Vic., c. 54, and that of auditing the accounts of the Commissioners of Charitable Donations and Bequests under the Act 7 and 8 Vic., c. 97. When the Equity Exchequer was abolished in 1850, the Chief Remembrancer became a Master in Chancery and continued his duties as auditor. He was subsequently styled Receiver Master, and the duty of auditing the above accounts was continued by him and his successor. The office of County Treasurer was abolished in 1867 by the Act 30 and 31 Vic., c. 46, and the duties distributed between a banking company and the secretary of the Grand Jury, but the accounts, which were now kept by a banking company, were still audited by the Receiver Master till 1877, when, by the Judicature Act, the office of Receiver Master was abolished and his duties as auditor handed over to the Local Government Board.

# POPULATION AND CENSUS RETURNS.

The first official enumeration of the people of Ireland was authorised, by the Act 52 Geo. III., c. 133, to be taken in the year 1813. The administration of this Act was committed to the Grand Juries, but was so negligently carried out that it became necessary to pass the Act of 55 Geo. III., c. 120, under which preparations were made to secure a correct return of the population. This Census was taken in 1821, since when it has been taken every decade. Hardly any of the returns of the Census taken in 1813 are known to be in existence. See Deputy Keeper's Report XXVIII., pp. 9, 10; the collections of the various Clerks of the Peace, and the Preliminary Observations in the "Abstract of Answers and Returns," Census of 1821.

Religious Returns, 1764-8.

During the period 1764-8, returns were called for by the Committees of Religion and made by the hearthmoney collectors, etc., of the different districts, of the number of inhabitants in Ireland, distinguishing their religion; also of the number of priests, etc., in the district. Also, by order of the House of Lords, 1766, the clergy of each parish were directed to return the number of Protestant and Roman Catholic families in their parishes. Many of these latter are only numerical returns, but some contain the names of the heads of the families also. Both the above classes of returns will be found amongst Returns (Religious), PARLIAMENTARY COLLECTION.

Returns of population made under the Act 1 Will. IV., c. 19. These returns contain lists of houses, with name of head of household, number of persons in each household, number engaged in agriculture, as servants, etc.

Enumerators' Schedules.

Answers by enumerators to schedules as set out in the Act 1 Will. IV., c. 19.

Census, 1834 (Religious).

In 1934 a commission was issued for inquiring "respecting the state of religious and other instruction now existing in Ireland." In connection with this inquiry, a census was taken of the number of those belonging to the different religious bodies in Ireland.

Population Returns.

These returns were made on the basis of the population returns for 1831, and contain the list of houses, names of occupier or occupiers, number of persons in family, and their religion.

Returns to Queries.

Ecclesiastical Returns.

These were returns to ascertain the limits of the parishes, with the townlands included therein, and other ecclesiastical information.

Miscellaneous Papers.

These are original census returns taken by the enumerators, etc.

This census was taken under the Act 3 and 4 Vic., c. 100.

Population Returns.

These returns are very similar to the returns taken at the present time, with the exception of religion, which these returns did not contain. There are special returns of occupiers, military and schools.

Abstracts and Tables.

These are abstracts, mostly numerical, of such social aspects of the community as occupations, ages, education, emigration, deaths, etc., which will be found printed in the Report of the Commissioners.

Miscellaneous.

Census, 1851.

This Census was taken under the Act 13 and 14 Vic., c. 44.

Population Returns.

These returns contain information of a similar nature to the present returns, with the exception of religion. There are also special returns made for houses, buildings and ships (Form B). the sick (Form C), insane or idiots (Form D), inhabitants of workhouses (Form E), hospitals (Form F), residential schools and colleges (Form G), military barracks (Form H), lunatic asylums and gaols (Form I), prisons and bridewells (Form K), and schools (Form L).

Abstracts and Tables.

Most of these are tables made out in the office from the returns. The Emigration Tables, however, contain the names of emigrants from the various ports of Ireland for 1851-5.

## MRS. BAYLY'S ACCOUNT BOOKS.

Domestic Account Books (1721-74) kept by Mrs. Bayly, wife of John Bayly, deputy clerk of the Pells. This accounts for the fact that these books were found amongst the records of the Vice-Treasurer's Office, transferred to this office from the Custom House. There is also a volume of accounts kept by her son, as her executor, for 1775-91. ## PURCHASES AT SALES OF SIR THOS. PHILLIPPS' LIBRARY.

MSS. chiefly connected with the Southwell family, one of whom, Sir Robert Southwell, was clerk of the Privy Council, envoy extraordinary to several foreign courts, and subsequently became Secretary of State for Ireland. He accompanied King William in his campaign in 1690. # REGISTERS OF IRREGULAR MARRIAGES.

These are registers of certain irregular marriages, celebrated in Dublin between the years 1799-1844, which were purchased by the Government in 1900 from the executor of the late Arthur Samuels, esq. These marriages were celebrated either at No. 9, Haymarket, or at Cullenswood, by clergymen in holy orders, but without the publication of banns or the granting of a licence. They were popularly styled "couple beggars." For a full account of these registers, see the Deputy Keeper's Report XXXIV., appendix 2. A register of the Revd. J. G. F. Schulze, for 1835-9, is in the custody of the Registrar-General. They are set out in detail in the Miscellaneous Detailed Index.

# TRUSTEES OF THE LINEN MANUFACTURE.

## TRINITY COLLEGE, DUBLIN.

The Library of Trinity College, Dublin, contains the following collections which should be searched for official or semi-official Irish documents.

Ussher Collection.

After the death of Archbishop Ussher, his library was bought for £2,200 by Cromwell's army and presented to the College.

#### Stearne Manuscripts.

Dr. John Stearne, bishop of Clogher, bequeathed to the College in 1741 the collection of MSS. formerly belonging to Dr. John Madden. Here will be found 33 volumes of depositions, informations, returns, etc., being papers of a Commission issued under the Great Seal in October, 1641, to inquire into the "losses sustained by Loyal Protestants at the hands of the Popish Rebels" in the rising of that year, obtained by Madden at the sale of the effects of Matthew Barry, who had been clerk of the Council.

### Alexander Manuscripts.

This is a portion of a bequest in 1674 by Sir Jerome Alexander, one of the Justices of the Common Pleas in Ireland. It contains Precedents of cases in the Irish Court of Castle Chamber (Star Chamber), No. 852, and Cases adjudged in the Court of Wards, Eliz.-Jas. I., No. 855.

# Clarke's Correspondence, 1690-4 (13 vols.), No. 749.

Dr. Geo. Clarke came to Ireland with King William as Secretary at

## ROYAL IRISH ACADEMY.

When the Stowe Manuscripts (which included the collection of MSS. relating to Ireland formed by Charles O'Conor of Bellanagare, co. Roscommon) were purchased in 1883 by the Government, the MSS. written in Irish, and others relating to Ireland, including sixteen volumes of Books of Survey and Distribution, were handed over to the Royal Irish Academy. These Books of Survey and Distribution were made in 1677 by Thomas Taylor by order of the Lord Lieutenant, and contain more information as to the distribution of lands than the corresponding set in the Public Record

# ARCHBISHOP MARSH'S LIBRARY, DUBLIN.

This library contains the collections of Narcissus Marsh, Archbishop of Dublin, who founded it in 1701; John Stearne, Bishop of Clogher; Dudley Loftus, and others. In it there are four Registers of Faculties, 1745-1829.

Throckmorton and Conway Papers.

(1) Sir Nicholas Throckmorton (chamberlain of the Exchequer, temp. Eliz.) His papers were placed by his son, Arthur, at the disposal of Sir H. Wotten, who bequeathed them to King Chas. I., to be placed in the Paper Office, a bequest which remained unexecuted till 1857, when they were handed over by Mr. J. W. Croker.

(2) Sir Edward Conway (Baron Conway and Viscount Killultagh, Secretary of State, James I. and Charles I.) These papers were passed to Popham Seymour, in whose favour the barony of Conway was revived, which was afterwards merged in the marquisate of Hertford. The papers were transferred by him to Mr. J. W. Croker, who deposited them in the Public Record Office, England, and the British Museum,

The Throckmorton Papers have been utilised in editing the State Papers (Ireland) for the reign of Elizabeth, and those of Conway for the reign of James I.

#### BRITISH MUSEUM.

Harleian Manuscripts.

This collection was founded, at the end of the seventeenth century, by Robert Harley, earl of Oxford. The papers were derived from the collection of Sir Thos. Smith; Fox, the martyrologist; Stowe (which collection comprises the Essex Papers, amongst which will be found the official correspondence of Lord Essex, as Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, 1672-7), Archbishop Sancroft, and Sir Symond D'Ewes, who obtained some of the papers of Sir Thomas Stafford, editor of Pacata Hibernia. See Liber Munerum Publicorum Hiberniae, part III., pp. 9-13, for list of documents in this collection concerning Ireland.

Lansdowne Manuscripts.

Collected by William, third earl of Shelburne, and first marquis of Lansdowne, and consist of-

The papers of Lord Burghley passed into the possession of Sir Michael Hickes. They were sold by a descendant of his to a bookseller, Chiswell, from whom they passed to Strype, the historian. On his death, this collection was sold to James West, and purchased from his executors

The Caesar Papers belonged to Sir Julius Caesar, Chancellor of for the Shelburne Library. the Exchequer, 1603. They were sold in 1757, and acquired in 1770 by Lord Shelburne. In this collection should be particularly noticed: Drafts of official letters to the Lord Lieutenant and Lords Justices (vol. 1152), and five volumes of letters of Sir Paul Rycroft, while secretary to the Earl of Clarendon, Lord Lieutenant, 1686-9 (vol. 1153). See Liber Munerum, part III., pp. 13-17, for lists of documents in

this collection concerning Ireland.

This collection contains most of the Milles' collection in the Sloane Clarendon Manuscripts. Collection known as the Clarendon MSS. It was collected by Sir James Ware, and offered for sale in 1686, when it was purchased by the second Earl of Clarendon, then Lord Lieutenant of Ireland. It came subsequently into the hands of the Duke of Chandos. It was sold by auction in 1746. Those in this collection in the British Museum were presented by the Rev. Jeremiah Milles, dean of Exeter.

This collection, formed by Sir Robert Cotton, contains many important Cottonian Manuscripts. state documents regarding Ireland. For list of documents in this collection concerning Ireland, see Liber Munerum, part III., pp. 17-21. Sloane Manuscripts.

These comprehend the collection of Sir Hans Sloane, as well as papers from the collection of Birch, author of the Inquiry; Madox, the historiographer of Anne and Geo. I.; the remaining MSS. of Rymer not comprehended in his Foedera; those of Dr. Pococke, bishop of Ossory, Elphin and Meath; those of Jeremiah Milles, dean of Exeter, etc.

#### BODLEIAN LIBRARY, OXFORD.

In this Library is deposited the valuable collection of papers called "The Carte Papers," which contain many Irish State Papers and Entry Books belonging to the Earl of Ormonde. See "Final Report of the Commissioners for selecting Official Papers for transcription from the Carte Papers in the Bodleian Library "(Deputy Keeper of the Public Records, England, Report XXXII., appendix I.) Transcripts of many of these papers have been lodged in the Public Record Office, Ireland. (See Carte Papers, Extinct Commissions). There are also some of the Carew MSS. in this Library, and the Clarendon State Papers, the latter of which have been catalogued, 1869 and 1872, and published by the Clarendon Press, Oxford.

#### LAMBETH PALACE LIBRARY.

Here is deposited portion of the collection of papers which belonged to Sir George Carew, President of Munster, and which he bequeathed to Sir Thomas Stafford. They were made use of by him in producing his work, "Pacata Hibernia," printed in 1633. These papers have been calendared by Messrs. Brewer and Bullen, under direction of the Master of the Rolls, 1867. The other portion of the Carew MSS. will be found in the Bodleian Library, Oxford.

#### HISTORICAL MANUSCRIPTS COMMISSION.

The Royal Commission on Historical Manuscripts was first appointed in 1869, to inquire into such papers and manuscripts belonging to private families and institutions as would appear to be useful for purposes of history, general literature, etc., and to which access would be permitted. Amongst these will be found official documents and papers relating to Ireland. Much assistance in tracing the Irish documents will be obtained from "A Guide to the Reports on Collections of Manuscripts, etc., issued by the Royal Commission for Historical Manuscripts," 1914.

#### APPENDIX C.

Rules for the Admission of such Persons as ought to be admitted to the use of the Records, Calendars, Catalogues and Indexes, under section 17 of the Public Records (Ireland) Act, 1867.

#### General.

1. The Search Rooms shall be open to persons desiring to inspect or search Records or documents on every week-day, except Christmas Day to New Year's Day inclusive, St. Patrick's Day, Good Friday, Easter Eve, Easter Monday and Tuesday, Whit Monday, the day appointed to be kept as the King's Birthday, First Monday in August, and days appointed for public holidays.

2. The hours of admission shall be from 10 to 4.30 o'clock, except on

Saturdays, when they shall be from 10 to 2 p.m.

3. Calendars, Catalogues and Indexes preserved in the Search Rooms are open to all readers without fee or other restriction, save such restrictions as the officer in charge of the Search Rooms may consider necessary for the safety of the Books or the convenience of the officers or other readers, but subject to the provisions in Rule 20.

4. Persons admitted to the Search Rooms shall replace on the shelves

the Calendars, Catalogues and Indexes used by them. 5. Readers must not converse with each other. Strict silence must be observed in the Literary Search Room; and, as far as possible, silence shall be maintained in the General Search Room.

6. Smoking or any other dangerous practice is strictly forbidden within

the Record Building.

7. A separate docket, stamped, as required by the table of fees, shall be clearly written, and signed with name and address, by every applicant desiring to inspect or search any Record, for each Record or document required; and such docket shall be given by the applicant to the officer in charge of the Search Room before any Record or document can be 8. No docket for production of any Record shall be received after produced to the applicant.

4 o'clock, or after 1.30 on Saturdays.

9. No person shall have more than one Record or document at one time, except under special circumstances, to be explained to the satisfaction

10. In cases where a number of documents are grouped together (as of the officer in charge. in parcels of Returns, Cause Papers, Deeds Boxes, etc.), the applicant shall examine the papers in presence of an officer, searcher, or other assistant, and select from the group the papers he requires to read, which shall then be handed to him, one at a time, by the officer in charge.

11. No reader shall read or make use of a Record or paper produced

- upon the requisition of another reader. 12. Records and documents of exceptional value, or in fragile condition, may be produced subject to such conditions as the officer in charge of the room shall, in the particular case, think requisite for their safety
- 13. Records, documents, books or other articles belonging to the Public and integrity. Record Office, shall not be removed by readers from one room to another, or (except Indexes) be placed on the public counter.
- 14. Records and documents, when done with, shall forthwith be returned by the person to whom they have been produced, to the officer in charge, or to one of the attendants; and every such person shall be held responsible for the Records issued to him, until so returned.
- 15. No person shall lean upon any Records, documents or books belonging to the Public Record Office, or place upon them the paper on which he or she is writing, or do anything else which, in the opinion of the officer in charge, is calculated to injure the Record.

16. No person, other than an officer of the Record Office, or an officer of Court, duly authorised for the purpose, shall make any mark, in pencil or otherwise, upon any Record, document, or book belonging to the Public

17. Ink (whether in fountain pens, stylographs, or otherwise) shall not be used in the Public Search Room by any person admitted thereto for

the purpose of inspecting or searching Records or documents.

18. Tracings or Photographs of Records or documents shall not be made by any person without permission of the Deputy Keeper. Permission to photograph Records cannot be given without payment of the fees for certified copies, unless the Deputy Keeper is satisfied that the photographs are not to be used for the purpose of any legal proceeding in a Court of

19. Records in course of arrangement shall not be produced without

an order from the Deputy Keeper.

- 20. The officer in charge of the Search Rooms shall be empowered to exclude persons from the Public Record Office for any of the following reasons:-Wilful breach of the foregoing Rules and Regulations; persistent disregard of the officer's authority; damage of any sort to any Record or article belonging to the Record Office; any improper use of the Records, or of the information and privileges accorded to members of the public in the Office; conduct, language, habits, unseemly dress, or any other matter offensive, or likely to be reasonably offensive, to others using the Record Office. Provided always that the exclusion of any person shall be forthwith notified in writing with the cause thereof to the Deputy Keeper, who shall enquire into the circumstances, and whose order, unless reversed by the Master of the Rolls, shall be final.
- 21. Officers of Public Departments having occasion officially to consult the Records, shall, so far as they apply, be subject to the foregoing Rules for admission to and use of the Records.

### Special Regulations.

22. The documents contained in Deeds Boxes removed from the offices of the former Masters in Chancery and from the offices of the former Landed Estates Court are not open to the public. The contents of the boxes from the Chancery Master's offices may only be shown on the order, in the prescribed form, from the Chief Clerk to the Lord Chancellor or to a Judge of the Chancery Division, or a deputy nominated for this purpose.

The contents of boxes from former Landed Estates Court are to be shown only on similar order of the Registrar of the Land Judge, or his deputy, or the Keeper of the Deeds under the same Judge.

Officers having power to issue orders for inspection of Deeds Boxes may themselves deal with the contents, as to removing or returning them, on filling up and signing the usual inspection form, giving title and reference to Box. The contents of Boxes may be examined by the Registrars of Titles on filling up and signing the usual inspection form. Persons authorised to inspect contents of Deeds Boxes may make extracts or copies of documents contained in them.

- 23. MS. Books and Documents received from the Commander of the Forces in Ireland of later date than 1850 shall not be open to the public except on production by the applicant of a written permit, signed by the Commander of the Forces in Ireland, or by the Chief Staff Officer, Headquarters' Office, Ireland. Notes and extracts made under such a permit must be submitted to the officer in charge of the Search Room, and may, if it be considered necessary, be submitted to the Commander of the Forces in Ireland for approval, before being returned to the reader.
- 24. Documents deposited under 16th section shall be subject to the special conditions (if any) specified in the Warrant authorising their deposit, or which, by order of the Master of the Rolls, shall from time to time be imposed.

APPENDICES.

#### Entries on Records.

25. When, in pursuance of any Order of the Lord Chancellor, Master of the Rolls, or other Judge of the Chancery Division, it shall be necessary to make any amendment in or enter any Vacate or other matter upon any pleading or other document deposited in the Public Record Office, or when it may be necessary to enter thereon any Suggestion, on the proper officer attending at the Search Department of the Public Record Office, exhibiting to the officer in charge such Order (if any), and on his signing a requisition for such pleading or other document, it shall be produced to him, and he shall thereupon make such Amendment or Entry, and also every proper entry connected therewith in any Bill-book, Index, or other Book of Reference in said Department; and a book shall be kept in the Public Record Office containing a list of all such amendments or entries, with the dates thereof, under proper heads.

26. When in the King's Bench Division of the High Court, or in the Probate branch of said division, it shall be necessary to make any entry in writing upon any Record or document of said Division or branch, deposited in the Public Record Office, on the Master, or person certified in writing to be the proper officer by the Master of said Division, or on the proper officer of the Probate branch, attending at the Search Department of the Public Record Office, and delivering to the officer in charge there an Entry Docket in the prescribed form, signed by or on behalf of the said Master, or by the Registrar of the Probate branch, and on his signing the usual office requisition for such Record or document, the same, and all proper books in relation thereto, shall be produced to him, and he may thereupon make such entry, and also every proper entry connected therewith, in any Index or other Book of Reference in said Department; and books shall be kept in the Public Record Office containing lists of all such entries, with the dates thereof, under proper heads.

#### Recall.

27. Records, Deeds and Documents received from the offices of the former Masters of the Court of Chancery (except the Receiver Master), which may from time to time be necessary for the current business of the Chancery Division, may be recalled, in the form prescribed for that purpose, by the Chief Clerk to the Lord Chancellor or Judge of the Chancery Division, or an officer of his Department, to be nominated by such Chief Clerk, in writing, to the Deputy Keeper.

28. Like power of recall is given to the Registrar and the Keeper of Deeds of the Land Judge, or his deputy, for the Deeds Boxes; and to the Registrar, or his deputy, for the other Records transferred from the late Landed Estates Court, Land Judges' Offices, and Office of Receiver Moster.

29. Like power of recall is given to the Taxing Masters for the Records of their Offices.

30. Like power of recall is given to the Registrar in Bankruptey, or his deputy, for the Records transferred from the Bankruptey Offices.

31. When and so often as it may become necessary for the purposes of the Probate Branch, King's Bench Division, that any original Will, which has not been proved, and which has been removed to the Public Record Office under Warrant of the Master of the Rolls, should be remitted to said Branch for the purpose of being proved there; on the proper officer (certified to be such by the Registrar of the Principal Registry) attending at the Public Record Office, and presenting such certificate, and giving his receipt in the prescribed form, such Will may be delivered to such officer, to be retained at the Probate Office until further Order.

#### Extern Exhibition.

32. No Records (except under Rules 27 to 31, and 34 and 35) may be taken out of the Record Office without the written Order of the Master of the Rolls.

33. Should any person desire to produce an original Record in Court, application should be made to the Deputy Keeper, who, on being satisfied that the production is required for proof of handwriting or for some other purpose, which could not be served by a certified copy, shall issue to applicant a form of Order for the signature of the Master of the Rolls, to be obtained through his Secretary.

In all other cases, should production of an original Record be desired, a formal application must be made to the Master of the Rolls, in writing, addressed to his Secretary, setting forth the special reasons for which it is desired to produce the original.

34. In the absence of the Master of the Rolls from the Four Courts, the Deputy Keeper may permit Records to be sent to a Judge of the Supreme Court of Judicature or of the High Court of Justice when on the Bench at the Four Courts, on receipt of a request, signed by the said Judge, stating that the Record or Records in question are required for the information of the Court.

35. Records required for the use of the Master of the Rolls may be sent on written request of His Honor's Registrar.

36. In all cases where Records are allowed to be sent out of the Office (except those recalled under Rules 27 to 31) they shall go in the hands and remain in charge of officers of the Record Office.

Applicants obtaining Orders for the production of Records shall, before the Records leave the Office, produce, in Stamps, the amount of fees set out in the Table of Fees.

Where the Records for which such Orders for exhibition have been obtained have to be produced at any place outside the Four Courts, the officer attending shall be paid by the person who shall have obtained such Order all travelling expenses and reasonable allowance for subsistence. And where the Records to be produced are numerous or of more than usual bulk, the applicant shall pay for such additional assistance as in the opinion of the Deputy Keeper is requisite.

#### APPENDIX D.

Regulations made by His Excellency the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland concerning the Gratuitous Admission of Literary Inquirers to the State Papers, Records and Documents in the Record Tower, Dublin Castle.

13th January, 1893, as amended 9th December, 1909.

1st.—Applicants shall address a letter of application to the Keeper of the State Papers, stating generally the object of their research, and shall also, if needful, attend the Keeper of the State Papers personally thereon, and give such further explanation as may be required; and thereupon the Keeper of the State Papers shall, if satisfied with the statement and explanation, issue permission in writing empowering the applicant, or any trustworthy Agent or Transcriber on his behalf, to inspect all State Papers, Records, and Documents and their Indices, and also to make copies or extracts, without payment of fees,

#### APPENDICES.

2ndly.—All applications beforementioned shall be entered in a book, and be reported to the Lord Lieutenant once a year.

3rdly.—A Book shall be kept, in which the Keeper of the State Papers shall enter a note or particular of the State Papers, Records or Documents colled for, inspected or used by the applicants. This Book is to be considered as confidential, and not to be shown to the Public without the express permission of the Lord Lieutenant or Chief Secretary.

4thly.—In case of any impropriety of conduct or abuse of the privilege, the Keeper of the State Papers shall forthwith withdraw the permission granted, and report the same to the Lord Lieutenant or Chief Secretary.

5thly.—The Keeper of the State Papers shall not be required to examine, correct or certify any copy or extract made or taken by the applicant, but the applicant may, with the help of his Agent or Transcriber, examine the same with the Record.

6thly.—No applicant can be authorised to inspect any State Paper, Record or Document in the State Paper Department, Dublin Castle, bearing date subsequent to the 31st December, 1837, without the special written permission of the Lord Lieutenant or Chief Secretary.

Applicants will understand that the Keeper of the State Papers and persons employed in the Record Tower are not permitted to act as Record Agents, so that it will not be possible for the officers to assist them beyond the production of the Documents, and giving a general explanation, if needed, of their character and nature.
