held last night, one at Annesley Place and another at Millmount Avenue, Drumcondra.

The speakers at the first meeting were Matthew Stafford, P.L.G., (who presided), M.J.

O'Rahilly, Bulmer Hobson and Thomas McDonagh. About 400 persons were present including a Pipers' band, and a contingent of 40 Irish Volunteers, 36 of whom carried rifles. When the proceedings closed, the brake, which was used as a platform, headed by the Volunteers and band, moved via Richmond Road to the place of second meeting at Millmount Avenue.

M. Stafford again presided, and the speakers were Bulmer Hobson, John Fitzgibbon, and Thomas McDonagh. The speeches were of the usual character. At both meetings the speakers strongly appealed to all young men to join the Irish Volunteers and be in a position to fight for their country. Hobson, in the course of his address, said that one of their members had been already deported, another would, he supposed, be also banished, but the third they could not find. McDonagh, before the proceedings closed, announced that no further public meetings would be held this week, but that all Volunteer Battalions and recruits would mobilise at 11 a. m. on Sunday next at their respective halls, and afterwards march through the principal streets of the City. This second meeting, I may add, was much smaller than the first, and made up chiefly of Sinn Feiners and their friends.
